Delphi Preservation Society (DPS) has presented its 2005 Recognition Award to Dick and Karyl Traeger.

The presentation was made at the Society's annual meeting held last month. The Recognition Award honors an outstanding contribution to the preservation of an historic structure in greater Delphi. It is presented to a property owner or to an organization that has had a

property nominated by a DPS member during the previous calendar year.

"The Brick" is located at 203 E. Monroe Street in Delphi and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as the Barnett-Seawright-Wilson House. It is also featured on the cover of "99 Historic Homes of Indiana." Built in 1857, the residence is a combination of the Greek Revival and Italianate architectural styles.

## State Police make 80 criminal arrests in May

Indiana State Police at the Lafayette Post have released statistics for May. Troopers issued 1070 traffic citations and wrote 793 traffic warnings. Troopers also arrested 22 drunk drivers and made 80 criminal arrests. They also investigated 47 vehicle crashes and made 80 crash arrests.

Detectives from the Criminal Investigations Division, working from the Lafayette Post, worked 12 new cases and assisted the troopers in total criminal arrests.

Motor Carrier Inspectors from the Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division, working in the Lafayette District, inspected 218 commercial motor vehicles. A total of 27 commercial vehicles and 9 commercial drivers were placed out of service for various violations. There were 6,273 vehicles weighed with 12 trucks cited for overweight violations and 15 warnings issued for weight violations.
