**You and Your Pet**

Dear Dr. Wise: I have heard an "urban myth" that United States pennies are poisonous to dogs but Canadian pennies are not. What is the truth, if any, to this statement?

**Answer:** Both pennies could potentially be poisonous to a dog that had ingested several of them, but in different ways. In 1982 the United States mint switched the composition of US pennies from copper to mostly zinc with a thin copper coating. Fourteen years later in 1996 Canadian pennies followed suit and also switched from copper to zinc.

Thus, depending upon the date of the coin ingested, a US penny could cause zinc toxicosis while ingesting a Canadian penny could produce copper toxicosis. Of the two, the zinc poisoning had the greater potential to cause death. Zinc causes a type of anemia called a hemolytic anemia in which the red blood cells lyse or break

apart. Secondary to this, the hemoglobin released from the lysed red blood cells could damage the kidneys and, if severe enough, could cause kidney failure.

Ingested copper pennies initially cause stomach and intestinal irritation resulting in diarrhea and vomiting (which could be severe if left untreated or if several copper pennies were ingested). But unless there were a large number of copper pennies ingested or copper pennies were repeatedly ingested over a period of time, the liver would be able to excrete copper that was absorbed from the pennies in the intestinal tract. Zinc toxicosis from pennies is cited far more frequently in the veterinary literature than copper toxicosis from pennies. If you suspect your pet has ingested pennies or other coins, contact your veterinarian.
