

# Lessons from the Heart

## The importance of pain

Six-year-old Ashlyn Blocker literally feels no pain. Ashlyn is one of a handful of people in the world with Congenital Insensitivity to Pain, or CIPA, an extremely rare genetic disorder that prevents her from sensing pain.

"You might think that's a good thing," says Ashlyn's

mother Tara, "But it's not. Pain is there for a reason."

We humans will do anything to avoid pain in life. In some Christian circles it's become quite standard to teach, explicitly or by not so subtle inference, that "faithful" Christians are immune to or exempt from pain. Nothing could be further from the truth, or more injuri-

ous to our Walk.

In the book of James, chapter one we are told to "Consider it all joy, my brethren, when you encounter various trials, knowing that the testing of your faith produces endurance." And the Apostle Paul talked in 2<sup>nd</sup> Corinthians of being afflicted, persecuted, and "struck down", but NOT being crushed or perplexed in the face of it all.

"Pain is there for a reason."

Pain indicates that something is wrong in the body. Ashlyn's parents live in fear that she will develop infections with no outward symptoms. Such illnesses could progress rapidly to the point of being deadly. Pain in our lives lets us know that something is going on that's not quite right and needs attention, needs to be fixed.

Pain helps a person avoid unhealthy behaviors. When her baby teeth came in Ashlyn chewed her lips, tongue, and fingers until they were cut and bleeding. Her teachers have to put ice in Ashlyn's chili at lunchtime - otherwise she will gulp down scalding hot food. Sometimes we have to experience pain in life to learn that some behaviors are hurtful and dangerous, and should not be repeated.

Pain helps the body heal. When the brain senses pain, it triggers the release of healing agents that rush to the injured

area and begin the body's natural healing process. Ashlyn's childhood bumps, scrapes, and bruises sometimes take months to heal. With the realization of pain in life should come the understanding that healing also comes.

Pain causes a hurting person to seek help. An injured child will run crying to mom or dad. Ashlyn "is not phased by" pain, according to Tara. When she was 3 years old, Ashlyn severely burned her hand on a pressure washer. Tara found her staring impassively at her blistered palm, oblivious to the pain, and unaware that she needed to be treated. The pain of life should drive us back to the Father for help, comfort, and healing.

Ashlyn's mom worries about not being able to explain CIPA to her daughter in a way she can understand. "There's only so much you can tell her - If she sees blood, she knows to stop."

That's good news for all of us. The blood - shed by Jesus Christ as he suffered pain and injury for us - reminds us that God's care and comfort are available for all who suffer from the pain of sinful lives. And the blood holds the promise of a life in glory, where there will be no more pain.

## FOCUS ON THE FAMILY

### Today's children are deluged with harmful influences

**QUESTION:** I have heard you say that we have shamefully mismanaged the present generation of children. Explain what you meant by that.

**DR. DOBSON:** I was referring to the many harmful influences that previous generations didn't have to confront - at least not to the degree that we see today. That includes safe-sex ideology, and violence and sexual imagery in movies, rock music and television; it refers to gang activity and drug abuse, and many other dangerous aspects of our culture. I was also speaking about the extreme emphasis on physical attractiveness and body consciousness in Western nations that is having a terrible impact on children. It can even be life-threatening to them.

A study done at the University of California showed that 80 percent of girls in the fourth grade have attempted to diet because they see themselves as fat. One elementary school girl justified her dieting by saying she just wanted to be skinny so that no one would tease her. How sad it is that children in this culture have been taught to hate their bodies - to measure their worth by comparison to a standard that they can never achieve.

At a time when they should be busy being kids, they're worried about how much they weigh, how they look and how they're seen by others. For young girls, this insistence on being thin is magnified by the cruelties of childhood. Dozens of studies now show that overweight children are held in low regard by their peers, even at an early age. According to one investigation, silhouettes of obese children were described by 6-year-olds as "lazy," "stupid" and "ugly."

This overemphasis on beauty does not occur in a vacuum, of course. Our children mirror our prejudices and our system of values. We, too, measure human worth largely on a scale of physical attractiveness. It's bad enough when adults evaluate each other that way. It's tragic when millions of children have already concluded that they're hopelessly flawed, even before

life has gotten started. We must take the blame for the many pressures on today's kids. Fifty years ago, parents and other adults acted in concert to protect kids - from pornography, sexual abuse, harmful ideas and dangerous substances. Millions of husbands and wives stayed together "for the benefit of the children." It was understood that tender minds and bodies needed to be shielded from that which could hurt them.

But now, child abuse and sexually transmitted disease are rampant. As the family has unraveled, and as adults have become more self-centered and preoccupied, children are often left to fend for themselves in a very dangerous world. It may be our greatest failing as a people.

**QUESTION:** I've read that it is possible to teach 4-year-old children to read. Should I be working on this with my child?

**DR. DOBSON:** If a youngster is particularly sharp and if he or she can learn to read without feeling undue adult pressure, it would be advantageous to teach this skill. But that's a much bigger "if" than most people realize. There are some parents who find it difficult to work with their children without showing frustration over immaturity and lack of interest.

Furthermore, new skills should be taught at the age when they are most needed. Why invest unnecessary effort trying to teach a child to read when he has not yet learned to cross the street, tie his shoes, count to 10 or answer the phone? It seems foolish to get panicky over preschool reading. The best policy is to provide your children with interesting books and materials, read to them every day and answer their questions. You can then introduce them to phonics and watch the lights go on. It's fun if you don't push too hard.

5. Put yourself in a time-out chair. Think about why you are angry: Is it your child, or is your child simply a convenient target for your anger?
6. Phone a friend.
7. If someone can watch the children, go outside and take a walk.
8. Take a hot bath or splash cold water on your face.
9. Hug a pillow.
10. Turn on some music. Maybe even sing along.
11. Pick up a pencil and write down as many helpful words as you can think of. Save the list.
