Reintroduced raptors set nesting record in 2006

Comet staff report

Department of Natural Resources biologist John Castrale and DNR pilot Dennis Rumley spent five workdays in a helicopter this spring swooping down Hoosier rivers and around Indiana's reservoirs searching for and checking eagle nests.

The aerial surveys turned up an Indiana-record 68 active nests. These nests fledged 91 new

Hoosier bald eagles. Castrale and Rumley counted 62 active nests in 2005.

More than a third of Indiana counties, including Carroll, now have eagle nests. Indiana's eagle nesting range continues to expand from southern and southwestern Indiana into the north-eastern and eastern parts of the state.

Three production check flights in May and June found 88 young eagles near fledging age, with single birds present at 17 nests, twins at 25 nests, and triplets at 7 nests.

Indiana eagle productivity figures were average this year, with nest success at 72 percent, 1.3 young per nest attempt, and 1.8 young per successful nest. Winds destroyed nests or nest trees in at least four instances.

Indiana's successful eagle nests in this area include:

- Carroll County, Wabash River near Rattlesnake Creek - Adult incubating on March 3; adult nearby. Three chicks and 1 adult on June 1.
- Cass County, Wabash River west of Logansport - Adult incubating on March 3. Two chicks and 1 adult on June 1.
- Tippecanoe County, Colliers Island, Wabash River - Adult incubating at new nest on island on March 3. One or 2 fledged chicks and 2 adults on June 1.
- Tippecanoe County, Tippecanoe River - Adult incubating on March 3. Two chicks on June 1.

From 1985 to 1989, 73 Alaskan and Wisconsin eagle chicks were raised by the Indiana DNR in artificial nests at Monroe Lake and released into the wild.

The first successful Indiana bald eagle nests of the 20th century were at Lake Monroe and Cagles Mill Lake in 1991. Before Indiana's reintroduction project, bald eagles last nested in the northwest corner of the state in 1897.

We're pleased to provide you with this year's Annual Quality Water Report. We want to keep you informed about the water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water.

I'm pleased to report that our drinking water meets state and federal requirements.

If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled City Council meetings. These meetings are held on the first Monday of every month at 7:00 p.m. in the City Council Chambers of the City Building.

The Delphi Water Works routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to State and Federal laws. Our monitoring for the period of January 1, 2005 to December 31, 2005 found no contaminants above the allowable limits.

The table below lists all the contaminants that we detected during the 2005 calendar year. The presence of these contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise indicated, the data presented in this table is from testing done between January 1 and December 31, 2005. The Indiana Department of Environmental Management (IDEM) requires us to monitor for certain contaminants at frequency less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from one year to another. Some of the data, though representative of the water quality, may however be more than one year old.

Some of the terms and abbreviations used in this report are:

MCL: Maximum Contaminant Level - the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water.

MCLG: Maximum Contaminant Level Goal - the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health.

MRDL: Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level - the highest level of disinfectant allowed in drinking water.

MRDLG: Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal - the level of drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health.

AL: Action Level - the concentration of a contaminant which, when exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements or action which a system must follow.

TT: Treatment Technique - a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

NTU: Nephelometric Turbidity Unit - a measure of the clarity (or cloudiness) of water.

ppm: parts per million, or milligrams per liter.

ppb: parts per billion, or micrograms per liter.

PCIL: picocuries per liter - a measure for radiation potential violation or one that is likely to occur in the near future.

P: either not available or not applicable.

ND: Not Detected - the result was not detected at or above the analytical method detection level.

Copper is an essential nutrient, but some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over a relatively short amount of time could experience gastrointestinal distress. Some people who drink water containing copper in excess of the action level over many years could suffer liver or kidney damage. People with Wilson's Disease should consult their personal doctor.

Nitrates: As a precaution we always notify physicians and health care providers in this area if there is ever a higher than normal level of nitrates in the water supply.

Our water source is ground water pumped from five wells. Our wells draw from a Solurian Dolomite Limestone Aquifer called the Delphi Reef. Wells 1, 2, and 3 are located along Carrollton Road next to the Carroll County Country Club. Well 4 is located at the end of North Union Street next to the Canal, and well 5 is near the intersection of 300N. and 700 W.

All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least a small amount of some contaminants. It's important to remember that the presence of these compounds does not necessarily pose a health risk. In order to ensure tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by substances that are naturally occurring or man made. These substances can be microbes, inorganic or organic chemicals and radioactive substances. All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Indiana Department of Environmental Management at 1-800-451-6027 or Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- * Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- * Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- * Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- * Organic chemicals, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- * Radioactive materials, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

A monitoring and reporting rule compliance violation occurred during the year, when nitrate samples were not taken within the schedule period for Entry Point No. 4. These samples were later taken and the drinking water levels for nitrate are within compliance.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines for immunocompromised persons to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Are you a critical water user? Who are critical water users? According to the definition "Critical water users" means water users whose immediate health or welfare would be affected in an adverse manner if water use is denied." This group of people includes hospitals, nursing homes, schools, day care, clinics, dialysis patients, immunocompromised persons, and others who depend critically on the supply of safe public drinking water. If you meet any of these criteria, please respond to this notice by contacting the Water Department.

Abandoned wells can serve as a direct channel for contamination of drinking water. Sometimes people have wells on their property they no longer use. Telltale signs that an abandoned well might be present include: a pipe sticking out of the ground, windmills, old hand pumps, an abandoned residence, an old cistern or even a wood cover laying over a hole in the ground.

If you have an old well on your property that has no foreseeable use in the future, the safest thing to do is to have the well properly abandoned by a well driller. The well driller will submit the appropriate forms to the Department of Natural Resources and the well will be added to a list of properly abandoned wells.
