Delphi to heat up next week

In an effort to keep Carroll County families safe, Delphi will be the hottest place in the county next Tuesday and Wednesday evenings between 6 and 8 p.m.

At the Monday night Delphi City Council meeting Tri-Township fire chief Bill Schock announced that next week is National Fire Prevention Week.

His department, with the help of several other county departments, will be providing demonstrations of the jaws-of-life, rope repelling, the smoke-house and fire safety trailer and door prizes, including free tee shirts for children. The activities will take place at the fire station on Main Street.

All families are urged to attend, meet firefighters and learn about fire safety in a con-

trolled setting.

"The goal is to teach families and little kids about fire safety," Schock said. "The kids will get to meet firefighters and see them in action, too."

Fire prevention activities will be held at all area schools and day care centers during the week.

Schock reported 22 fire runs last month.

Halloween Night

Council members set Oct. 31 from 6 to 8 p.m. as official trick-or-treat night in Delphi. Families with children are invited to participate in door-to-door candy seeking.

Police chief Ed Chapman said all parents should supervise their children by staying with them during the event. He further sug-

gested each child be equipped with a flashlight.

Other business

A request by Delphi Main Street Association for a facade improvement appropriation of \$5,000 was granted. The Oddfellows will receive the funding to assist with the renovation of their building on south Washington Street.

Delphi Preservation Society representative Anita Werling said this award has inspired other store owners to apply for funds.

The Oddfellows will be able to apply three colors of paint, rather than a single color, to the building's cornices for a more dramatic effect.

Two parking spaces will be eliminated from the corner of Main and Washington streets when INDOT moves the painted stop bars on those streets. The action is designed to allow more turning room for semi-tractor trailers at the intersection.

A resolution was adopted to loan the Delphi Municipal Airport no more than \$36,000, to complete payment for recent work at the south end of the runway. The airport will repay the loan with funds expected from a 2007 grant.

Airport manager Brian Stirm reported the construction is finished and the runway is usable day and night.

Stirm said full-service flight training, including light sport aircraft training, is expected to begin in the spring of 2007.

Re-zoning of property owned by Barbara Hess, which formerly housed the Louis Mullin law practice, was approved. The zoning was changed from business to urban residential.

United States and the State of Indiana flags are flying at Riley and Trailhead parks, according to park superintendent Richard Farrar.

Farrar reported the water will be shut off at the end of October at all city parks.

Wastewater department plant superintendent Dick VanSickle reported problems on Market Street. A control panel exploded at the lift station on Sept. 23 for unknown causes. The same lift station was isolated using the newly acquired six-inch diesel pump Sept. 29 to replace a faulty valve. Both incidents were completed within the week.

The next city council meeting will be Nov. 6 at 7 p.m. Delphi Board of Works next meets Oct. 18 at 5:30 p.m.

Flora learns moratorium on Medicaid beds stands

The Family & Social Services Administration has denied the request that the Brethren's Home be grandfathered against the moratorium placed on Medicaid beds by the state legislature last December.

The town recently purchased the property and is trying to have it reopened as a healthcare facility.

The moratorium will expire on June 30, 2007, if it is not extended by the legislature.

"We haven't given up hope," said clerk-treasurer Joretta Tinsman at Monday night's meeting of the Flora Town Council. She indicated the town will continue to work toward reopening the facility as a healthcare center.

"We're not going to sit back and wait on legislation," she said.

Council president Josh Ayres announced that the town has received a Petroleum Remediation Grant in the amount of \$84,520 through the Indiana Brownfield Program. The funds will be used to remove a buried tank and remediate the ground at the Brethren's Home property. An environmental study indicated that the tank is leaking. Removal of the tank will help ready the property for future use.

As a follow-up to inquiries made at the September Council meeting, Tinsman reported speaking with the Frankfort clerk-treasurer regarding their school demolition. She was told Frankfort did not use an engineer.

Councilman David Albaugh said that the town will continue to look at options regarding the old Flora School.

"We're looking for money," added Ayres.

Terry Lauderdale, through a letter, requested that town officials recognize the safety issue created by semis and trailers that park and turn around in his property, while waiting to fuel at a nearby service station. Lauderdale owns a business on the west side of SR 75, just north of the intersection with SR 18.

Town Marshal Paul Redmon said that he has contacted the State Highway Department and was told that a detailed letter was needed, explaining the situation, along with measurements. Thirty days after receipt of the letter, INDOT will put up "no parking" signs.

The Town of Flora was a recip-

ient, along with Burlington and Delphi, of a Local Government Cooperation Award for the shared Carroll County Recycling Program. Flora's award will hang in the town office.

Town officials approved advertising specifications for a two-year trash contract with the addition of two, six-lid containers during fair week.

Redmon reported that the new parking ordinance is in effect.

The police station has moved to 27 W. Main Street in the Fireside Building.

Tinsman reported that it is working well having the police station in the Fireside Building. When officers are away from the building, town office employees are able to assist residents and locate an officer to help them.

Redmon reminded residents that pranksters are often out in October, and to be mindful and keep doors and windows locked.

Police activity for September included: 12 arrests/misdemeanors, seven felonies, 31 citations, 55 warnings, 108 calls for service, five accidents, and three warrants served.

Tinsman reported that the town has received two checks for unclaimed properties, one for the volunteer fire department and the other for the wastewater treatment plant. The checks, in the amount of \$129.50 and \$160.67, will be deposited into the town's general fund.

Moonlight Madness will be held Saturday in downtown Flora. During the festivities, Channel 2 will host an open house from 6 to 8 p.m. to celebrate 25 years on the air.

Also this weekend at the log cabin at the park, there will be a rendezvous Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

The town office will be closed Monday in observance of Columbus Day.

Trick-or-Treat Night will be Oct. 31 from 6 to 9 p.m.

The next Council meeting will be Nov. 6 at 6 p.m. in the Fireside Building.

You and Your Pet

Dear Dr. Wise: I own an eight-month-old Springer Spaniel. I've been working Jake all fall and plan to hunt him on weekends. Are there feeding guidelines to follow to keep up his stamina on the long days of hunting and to keep him healthy during the entire season?

Answer: A day in the field with your dog is great sport and exercise for both of you. But without attention to nutrition, the pleasure of the hunt can become a nightmare for a dog. The exercise subjects him to extreme physical stress and can drain his energy supply (calories) which is stored in his liver.

Jake probably is close to his optimal weight, so you will want to feed him throughout the season to maintain it. Though you read a lot about protein requirements, your major concern should be to satisfy his high energy needs.

During a day of hunting, a dog will burn the normal amount of calories. So you should feed Jake extra rations on Thursday and Friday before a weekend hunt. Then, about 20

minutes before you leave for a hunt, give him half a normal days food. Also, fill your pockets with high quality dry food and feed him a few handfuls at a time throughout the hunt.

This feeding program is essential. Some dogs will be active and hunt well the rest of the day. Others may encounter much more serious problems and stumble, pant or even faint or have seizures due to hypoglycemia (a temporary drop in blood sugar) if they drain their energy supply. The dog needs an immediate "dose" of calories - a small amount of candy bar or Karo syrup. He will be through hunting for the day.

The important points to remember are to feed Jake extra rations before hunting and high-nutrition snacks throughout the day in the field. While he is young, Jake will need even more calories than he will as a mature adult.
