You and Your Pet

Dear Dr. Wise: My veterinarian said people can get zoonotic diseases. What does this mean?

Answer: You raise a really good question. A "zoonotic" disease is a disease of animals that may be transmitted to man under natural conditions. (Example: Rabies, parasites)

To keep your pets and family protected you should consider the following tips:

1. Practice good hygiene: Wash your hands before eating, and after handling any animal to prevent the spread of parasites.
2. Make sure your pet is healthy: Yearly physical examinations are recommended, and if your pet is over 5-7 years, it is best to have twice yearly examinations.
3. Keep your pet vaccinated: Your veterinarian will determine what vaccinations are necessary. Some

vaccines are given on a yearly basis, and some are given every 3 years.

4. Parasite detection: Have your pet's fecal sample checked microscopically by your veterinarian for parasites. I recommend checking fecals at least once per year.

5. Parasite prevention: The monthly heartworm medications that are dispensed through your veterinarian also protect against many common parasites. Ask your veterinarian what parasite prevention medications your pet should be taking. These medications should be given year round, and come in both topical and pill form.

then after two minutes of turnovers and missed shots by both teams, Brazel hit another 3-pointer to cut the gap to 41-40 with exactly 1:00 remaining.

Carroll was then forced to put University on the free-throw line to get the ball back, and the Trailblazers converted on 2 of 4 attempts. The Lady Cougars had the ball, trailing 43-40 with :10 left. McCarter was fouled attempting a 3-point shot with :03 left, but the official ruled she was passing the ball. The Lady Cougars got one last chance, taking the ball out under their own basket, but the inbounds pass went long, into the backcourt and time ran out.

Carroll shot better in the second half, hitting 7 of 17 attempts compared to 8 of 28 in the first half, but turnovers killed any momentum the Lady Cougars got going. Carroll committed 16 second-half turnovers, 9 in the decisive fourth quarter.

"Every time we got close we shot ourselves in the foot," McCroskey said. "It wasn't anything University did to us, we just had horrible fundamentals. Our defense was pretty good all night, but we don't value the basketball enough on offense. Our mistakes aren't aggressive mistakes, we just don't use our brains."

Eller and Brazel shared scoring honors for Carroll with 11 apiece. McCarter had 9. M. Yoder took an elbow to the face and left the game with a broken nose.

In the second and final Carroll Classic game Saturday, University defeated Rossville 58-38.

Carroll now has two RN's

Carroll School Board hired a school nurse, Jennifer Wellbaum, and a school nurse supervisor, Melinda Allbaugh, at its Dec. 4 meeting.

Both reside in Flora and both have been subbing in the nurse's position at Carroll.

Wellbaum graduated from nursing school at Parkland College in Champaign, Ill. She previously worked in the neo natal intensive care unit and in the surgical area at Home Hospital. More recently, she has been a stay-at-home mom and part-time secretary at Radnor United

Methodist Church. As school nurse, she will be stationed primarily at the elementary school but will go to the junior-senior high school as needed. The full-time position is effective immediately.

School nurse supervisor is a newly created position at Carroll and calls for a bachelor's degree in nursing. Superintendent John Sayers said the requirement conforms to a state regulation and is part of the school accreditation process.

Allbaugh received her BSN degree from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio. In 2001-2002 she was a private duty RN at Greater Lafayette Health Services. Her contract calls for up to 10 hours per week for the rest of the 2007-2008 school year. She will work at the junior-senior high school.

The proposed calendar for 2008-2009 has been put on the corporation website. Board member Mike Eikenberry said patrons have commented to him that they think there should be no classes on Good Friday. In recent years students have gone to school on Good Friday, and that will not change with the proposed calendar.

Although an agreement had been reached earlier between the corporation and the teachers on the Master Contract, the final document, with updates, was signed by board members at last week's meeting.

The board approved a fundraising request from the cheerleaders for a cheerleading clinic Jan. 4, with a performance to follow.

Junior-senior high school principal Charles Huckstep told about a new academic showcase built by Eldo Beam. It will house the math trophies and other academic awards.

Each sports season there is a competition among teams to see

who has the highest grade point average. For fall sports, the girls' golf team and the girls' cross country team tied for the honor, each with a GPA of 3.51. For junior high, the honor went to the boys' and girls' cross country team with a GPA of 3.66.

"We're really happy to get a win," Oracle head coach Brian Tonsoni said. "We overcame a lot of adversity this week, and that is what the game of basketball is all about."

"For the kids to respond the way they did tonight after such an emotional, heart-breaking loss the night before is just outstanding," he said. "I couldn't be any prouder of them."

After a defensive-struggle for most of the game which found the score just 29-20 after three periods, both teams seemed to find their offense in the final stanza with the Oracles putting 24 points on the board to the Cavs' 19.

Both teams experienced an offensive drought to start the game, which saw Tri-County take a 6-4 lead at the end of the 1st quarter. With the game tied at 8-8 early in the 2nd quarter, Delphi went on a 10-0 run to take an 18-8 lead that it would never relinquish.

The Oracles outscored TC 14-6 in the 2nd period to take an 18-12 lead into the halftime intermission. They extended their lead to nine at the end of the 3rd quarter.

The victory avenged last season's 43-26 loss at Tri-County in Delphi's worst offensive performance of the year.

Michael Myers led all scorers with 14 points, including 2-of-3 from three-point range, while Kory Banes added 12 points and shared team-high rebounding honors with Dustin Oliver with seven apiece.

Oliver chipped in with nine points, while Justin Snider added six, Matt Lewis five, Austin Hawn four, Kyle Bender two and Tanner Cripe one.

Vs. Clinton Prairie

Clinton Prairie hit a last-second three-pointer from the top-of-the-key to win it for the Gophers, 63-60.

Delphi trailed by as much as 11 points at 50-39 with 30 seconds left in the 3rd quarter before furiously fighting all the way back to tie the score at 60-60 on an Oliver three-pointer with 58.7 seconds to play.

But it was not to be as the Gophers (4-3) held onto the ball for the final shot, and Dustin Filbin swished it through the net as the buzzer sounded.

The Oracles (1-5) took their only lead of the game at 2-0 on two Hawn free throws before CP scored seven straight to take a lead that they would hold onto until the game's final minute. Delphi had four players score in double-figures led by Oliver's 21 points on 7-of-9 shooting from the field, followed by Myers with 18, Banes with 11 and Hawn with 10. Banes led the Oracles with eight rebounds, while Oliver added six boards.

JV wins two

Paul Zink led all scorers with a career-high 25 points on 12-of-18 shooting from the field and posted team-highs in both rebounds (6) and steals (8) to lead the Delphi JV (4-2) to a 45-33 victory over Tri-County.

Dustin Salyer added eight points, Kris Bender finished with six, while A.J. Erskin had four & Tanner Cripe two.

The young Oracles placed three in double-figures in their 47-33 win over the Gophers. They were led by Salyer's 13 points, Zink's 11 and Bender's 10.

Zink played an excellent all-

around floor game leading Delphi with nine rebounds, seven steals and four assists.

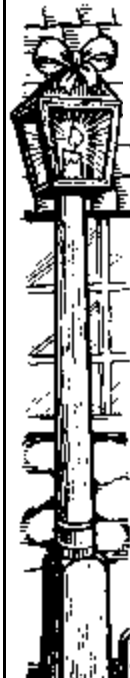
Cripe added eight points and six boards, with Seferino Cervantes and Jo Britt chipping in with two points apiece and Erskin with one.
