## 10 YEARS AGO

The new CVS Pharmacy, formerly Revco, opened Sunday on US 421 in Delphi. The new store includes a drive-up window for picking up prescriptions and a food mart.

Carroll County United Fund has surpassed its goal of \$51,700. As of December 31, total contributions received were \$51,831.06.

In 1947, Babe Randolph built a service station on State Road 25 in Burrows. He offered gasoline, tires, auto parts and even servicing. The store survived 50 years, and until recently belonged to and was operated by Phil and Terri

According to Joseph Peterson, official government weather observer for Carroll County, 1982 was a "wet" year with 6.35 inches above normal rainfall.

Rainfall in December totaled 4.55 inches, which was 237 inches above normal. The year's total was 42.63 inches. The most on any one day was 1.03 inches on Christmas Day.

December's highest temperature was 71 degrees on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and lowest was 5 degrees on the 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup>. Average high temperature for the month was 46.5 degrees and average low was 32.9 degrees. For the month temperature was 13.2 degrees above normal.

December gave the county two and one-half inches of snow. **50 YEARS AGO**

Pat Meade showed her Shorthorn cross-bred steer which was named Grand Champion Shorthorn at the International Livestock Exposition at Chicago. Pat, 18, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Meade, Camden.

The honor won by Miss Meade is the highest ever brought to Carroll county from the International Livestock Exposition steer competition.

Her shorthorn steer, Rowdy, weighed 950 pounds and as class champion competed with two other class champions for the coveted final Grand Champi-

onship which went to another Indiana girl whose animal was bought for better than \$30,000. One judge is reported to have told Miss Meade that the fact that "Rowdy" was a crossbred animal, half Hereford and half Shorthorn, may have kept him from being made Grand Champion, as no crossbred has been Grand Champion since 1927. **75 YEARS AGO**

# FOCUS ON THE FAMILY

## Children often fight to get parents attention

**QUESTION:** Sometimes I feel as though my children fight and argue as a method of attracting my attention. If this is the case, how should I respond?

**DR. DOBSON:** You are probably correct in making that assumption. Sibling rivalry often represents a form of manipulation of parents. Quarreling and fighting provide an opportunity for both children to "capture" adult attention. It has been written: "Some children would rather be wanted for murder than not wanted at all." Toward this end, a pair of obnoxious kids can tacitly agree to bug their parents until they get a response - even if it is an angry reaction.

One father told me that his son and his nephew began to argue and then beat each other with their fists. Both fathers were nearby and decided to let the fight run its natural course. During the first lull in the action, one of the boys glanced sideways toward the passive men and said, "Isn't anybody going to stop us before we get hurt?!" The fight, you see, was something neither boy wanted. Their violent combat was directly related to the

presence of the two adults and would have taken a different form if the boys had been alone. Children will "hook" their parents' attention and intervention in this way.

Believe it or not, this form of sibling rivalry is easiest to control. The parent must simply render the behavior unprofitable to each participant. I would recommend that you review the problem (for example, a morning full of bickering) with the children, and then say, "Now listen carefully. If the two of you want to pick on each other and make yourselves miserable, then be my guest (assuming there is a fairly equal balance of power between them). Go outside and fight until you're exhausted. But it's not going to occur under my feet anymore. It's over! And you know that I mean business when I make that kind of statement. Do we understand each other?"

Having made the boundaries clear, I would act decisively the instant either child returned to his bickering. If I had separate bedrooms, I would confine one child to each room for at least 30 minutes of complete bore-

dom without radio, computers or television. Or I would assign one to clean the garage and the other to mow the lawn. Or I would make them take a nap. My purpose would be to make them believe

me the next time I asked for peace and tranquility. It is simply not necessary to permit children to destroy the joy of living. And what is most surprising is that children are the happiest when their parents enforce reasonable limits with love and dignity.

**QUESTION:** Do you think it is healthy for a husband and wife to work together and to be in each other's company 24 hours a day?

**DR. DOBSON:** That sometimes works out fine. It depends on the individual couple. I can tell you, however, what is typical. According to behavioral researchers, the healthi-

est marriages and those with the highest sexual voltage are those that "breathe" - relationships that move from a time of closeness and tenderness to a more distant posture, and then come together for another reunion as the cycle concludes.

This is why it's not always advantageous for a husband and wife to work together or to concentrate exclusively on one another in the absence of friends and colleagues outside the family. There is something about the diversity of interests and activities by each partner that keeps a couple from consuming one another and burning-out the relationship in the short-run.

Marriage is, after all, a marathon and not a sprint. Husbands and wives need to maintain a regenerating system that will keep love alive for a lifetime. Cultivating a healthy interest in many things is one big step in that direction.
