chair accessible. In the meantime they will solicit donations from businesses and do fundraisers for the ongoing project.

Burge said the Senior Center has agreed to supply the water for the garden. A question was raised as to whether the nearby creek water could be used instead.

Police department

Town Marshal Paul Redmon reminded residents that it is their responsibility to register their animals with the town. If the animal gets loose it is the only way the animal can be identified and returned to the owner.

Because there is no animal control, it is up to police to determine what to do with unrestrained animals.

Redmon told about a recent incident at Flora Community Park where a man was walking his dog when it was attacked by an unrestrained pit bull. Because the pit pull had a collar on, the man was able to grab the collar and subdue the dog, but not after the man's dog was severely injured and he sustained an injury to his hand.

He reminded residents that the town has a leash law and other ordinances requiring that pets be immunized and have tags. Any liability caused by the animal is the owner's responsibility.

It is Indiana law, said Redmon, that all occupants of trucks must use seatbelts (factory-installed). Riders are not permitted in the pickup truck bed, either. Redmon said he would check into how this affects parades.

The activity report for May included: 17 arrests/misdemeanors, 5 felonies, 46 citations, 3 parking violations, 94 warnings, 120 calls for service, 4 accidents, and 3 warrants served.

VFD celebration

Flora Volunteer Fire Department will celebrate its 100th an-

niversary the weekend of the 4th of July.

"We have made several improvements to this year's fireworks display," said Chief Scott Sisson. "On July 5 we will have an open house at the station. We hope everyone will come and the weather will cooperate."

Other business

George Capitanio of Air Indiana requested permission to use the big ball diamond on July 4 for skydiving demonstrations.

He also asked the council to consider allowing RV hook-up at the airport for weekend use only. Air Indiana will pay any expenses.

Ayres said they will consider his request but the town first needs to check with its insurance carrier.

Town employees are sweeping streets as needed and picking up brush and yard waste. They have also been cutting tree limbs and doing general maintenance at the park.

Ayres asked residents to not sweep all of their yard debris into the catch basins. "They aren't trash receptacles," he said.

The debris is clogging the catch basins and cleaning them is taking up wastewater employees' time from other work that needs to be done, added Ayres.

TBIRD Design Services has submitted a compliance plan for the town to IDEM. The plan outlines steps that TBIRD and the town will follow to locate and eliminate the inflow and infiltration in the town's sewer collection system.

Council members will attend a Round Table in Wolcott on June 23.

The town office will be closed July 4; however trash will be picked up that day as usual.

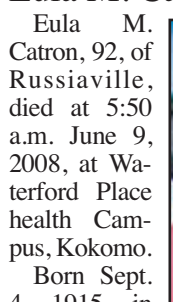
Mrs. Gerard retired in 1992 from Landis-Gyr in Lafayette after 16 1/2 years as a programmer in the electronics lab.

p.m. Saturday. The ceremony will include a 20-minute play called "Life on the Canal." It will be performed by Delphi area youth at 1:30 p.m. and again at 3 p.m.

The play will be presented with the boat in the background, and the audience will sit in the lawn basin in front of the Canal Center. Visitors might want to bring their own blankets or lawn chairs.

The Wheelmen will ride along the towpath all day on their old-fashioned bicycles, such as a bicycle built for two and high wheelers.

Visitors can ride in the canal pontoon boat, the pony cart, and horse-drawn carriage, or walk on Delphi's Historic Trails. The Interpretive Center and Case House will be open, and there will be food available in the park.

Sunday

Sunday's events will take place at the Delphi Airport and at the Carrollton Bridge, each according to its own time schedule.

Airport festivities will start with a balloon launch at dawn, followed by a breakfast. Food and drink will be available throughout the day.

Plane, helicopter, balloon, and glider rides also will be offered throughout the day.

The Carroll Car Club will have a cruise-in at the airport from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

WASK will spin the oldies live from the airport from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., and the Black Creek Rising band will play rock and roll music from 1 to 4 p.m.

The Delphi Airport is located at 8296 W. Division Line Rd.

Several events are planned at the Carrollton Bridge, located five miles north of Delphi at the intersection of Tow Path and Carrollton roads. Parking will be available a quarter of a mile south of the bridge, at the base of the Carrollton Hill on Towpath Road. Frequent trolley service will provide transportation to the bridge and after the ceremonies, will return visitors to their vehicles. The bridge will be closed to traffic for two hours.

Festivities will begin at 2 p.m. at the south end of the bridge.

Carroll County Commissioners will have a re-dedication of the bridge to recognize major reconstruction work and to signify the bridge's re-opening. The rehabilitation work, which included repairs and widening the bridge to 24 feet, earned awards from the American Council of Engineering Companies and the Indiana Partnership for Transportation Quality. The 1927 bridge was brought up to today's standards, but maintains its historic look.

The six-span, 615-foot long, concrete bridge with filled arches was designed by Daniel Luten and is on the National Register of Historic Places.

At 2:15 p.m., participants will walk to the opposite end of the bridge for the dedication of Grantham's Landing and Mary K's Overlook. These are land donations to the Wabash & Erie Canal Association for interpretive development of historic sites related to the canal. Land donors are the Grantham and Johnsen families.

Carrollton is where the Wabash & Erie Canal crossed the Wabash River. Former canal structures near the bridge were the Mentzer Tavern, a popular canal stop-over, and Lock 32.

The Wabash Water Trail will be dedicated by the Wabash Heritage Corridor Commission at 2:30 p.m. under the bridge. This ceremony will be followed by music and refreshments.

Around 3 p.m., there will be a demonstration of a Model T Hill Climb on the Carrollton Hill.

Canoe race

The last event of the day, in conjunction with the water trail dedication, will be a canoe race from Carrollton to Pittsburg. Teams can still sign up by calling the Carroll County Highway Department, 574-967-4244 or emailinghighway.dept@ffni.com. The canoe launch is part of the development of the site.

The Heritage Transportation Festival is sponsored by Delphi Main Street, along with the Wabash & Erie Canal Association and the Delphi Airport.
