She has advanced to the Regionals the past three years and will try to make it four, with hopes of advancing to the State Finals. She has come up two strokes shy of advancing each of the past two years.

Last week the Carroll Girls Golf team played some tough opponents and came up a little short, but the effort was there.

On Sept. 8, the Cougars traveled to Green Acres Golf Course to take on Northwestern. Carroll lost 174 to 200. Garrison was medalist and led Carroll with a 1 over par 37. The other Carroll scores were: Taylor Sproul 46, Malena Zook 54, Kirstin

Arkwright 63, Emma Packard 72 and Katie Unger 78.


Sept. 9th was a 3-way match at the Frankfort Country Club with Frankfort and Tipton. Carroll finished second with a 208, behind Frankfort with 201. Tipton finished third with a 213. Garrison was medalist with a 41. Carroll's scoring was rounded out by Sproul with 52, Zook 53, Arkwright 62, Packard 64 and Unger 66.

Sept. 11 found the Cougars at Coyote Crossing Golf Course in Lafayette on a rainy evening taking on Harrison and Central Catholic. Harrison won with a 180, followed by CC with 183 and Carroll 211. Garrison was co-medalist with a 2 over 38. Other Cougar scores were Sproul 54, Zook 57, Arkwright 65, Packard 62, and Unger 64.

The Cougars ended regular

season with 6 wins and 8 losses on its toughest schedule yet.

"I'm very proud of all the girls," commented Carroll Coach Erin Garrison. "They've worked hard all season and have had fun along the way. We've seen some personal bests from each girl on the team and have continued to improve on their scores all season."

# Cougars shake off mistakes to beat Eagles

Despite a lot of mistakes by the Cougars, when the horn sounded at the end of the game Carroll was 4-0 after defeating the Fremont Eagles 40-14.

The referees called 19 flags for 190 yards on both teams; a few of them were questionable. Of those penalties, 11 were called against the Cougars for a total of 120 yards, most for holding penalties.

The Cougars received the opening kickoff. On their first possession they fumbled the

football on third down, with the Eagles recovering the ball on the 26-yard line. Fremont could not move the football and elected to go for a field goal. However the kick went right behind strong W-SW winds.

The Cougars could not move the ball and were forced to punt. Riley Eller got the ball back for Carroll when he intercepted a Fremont pass. The Cougars went 4 and out.

Fremont had problems running against the front wall of the Cougar defense, however they did find success going around the ends.

The Cougars finally found the end zone in the second quarter when Eller found Skylar Bagwell for a 43-yard touchdown pass at 9:03. The PAT kick was blocked and it was 6-0 CHS.

The Cougars stiffened their defense. After a big hit by Drake Harper, then a hit by Brandon Williamson and a hit by Eller, the Eagles were forced to punt. A not so good punt into the wind gave the Cougars great field possession.

Two major penalties were called against Carroll for holding, but Eller came through when he found Car-

son Spesard for a 24-yard TD pass play. The two-point conversion was no good. By halftime the score was still 12-0, Carroll.

The Cougars started pulling it all together in the third quarter. They put 21 points on the scoreboard. Drew Yoder scored on a 10-yard run and the 2 point conversion was good. Ben Bennington scored on a 23-yard TD run. The 2-point conversion failed.

Fremont got its first score on a 65-yard kickoff return by Kenny Wren. Carroll blocked the PAT and the score was 25-6 CHS.

The Cougars bounced right back. Bennington scored again, this time on a 33-yard run. Bagwell kicked the PAT and the score was 33-6 CHS as the third quarter came to a close.

In the fourth quarter the Cougars scored again when Eller found Spesard for an 18-yard TD pass.

Fremont countered with the last score of the game when Jared Swager found Kenny Wren on a 45-yard TD pass. Swager ran it in for the 2-point conversion play, as the final score was 40-14 CHS.

Bennington did the heavy work for Carroll carrying the football 19 times for 141 yards with 2 TDs. Eller was 10-19-1 for 194 yards and 3 passing TDs. Spesard caught 3 passes for 58 yards and 2

TDs and Skylar Bagwell caught 2 passes for 59 yards and 1 TD.

Jonathan Bush with 16 tackles led the defense. Brandon Williamson and Thomas Gillam split 20 tackles. Eller also had 8 tackles and 2 interceptions.

The Cougars have a big test Friday night when they play the Class A 7th ranked Central Catholic Knights. The defense will have to contain a very good Knight QB. Chris Mills. Kick-off is at 7 p.m. at the LCC field.

The Carroll Varsity Soccer team had another solid week last week starting with a 4-1 win over visiting Twin Lakes High School.

The Cougars got started just two and a half minutes into the game on a goal by senior Chase Meade with an assist from Michael Myer. Meade got his second goal of the game 15 minutes later by taking the ball about 50 yards to the goal and beating the Twin Lakes defense and goalie. The Cougars took the 2-0 lead into the second half until Meade added his third at the 20-minute mark off an assist from Justin Moffitt. Meade finished off his highest scoring game of the sea-

son with his fourth goal off of a Blake Seward pass. Twin Lakes scored with just over 3 minutes to go to break the shutout. Cody Abdon finished with 8 saves in goal for Carroll.

At Caston on a wet Thursday night the Cougars won a hard fought 4-1 battle. Caston came out fast and scored a goal off the foot of Garrett Johnson just 2 minutes into the game. The rest of the first half was controlled, mostly by Caston. The Cougars were able to get one in the goal off of the head of Meade that was delivered into the goal by a corner kick from Myer. The score was knotted at 1 at the half.

Carroll came out a lot sharper in the second half and took a 2-1 lead just over 5 minutes into the second half on a Meade goal on a follow of a Myer kick. The Cougars replayed the previous goal about 3 minutes later with a goal by Junior Codey Meade, again off of a Myer kick. Chase Meade finished the scoring for the night with about 10 minutes to go with an assist going to Keil Lester. Abdon had 9 saves for Carroll and Shawn Rentschler had 9 saves for the Comets.

The Cougars are now 8-1 on the year.

Carroll played at home against Lafayette Faith Baptist yesterday, Tuesday, and will play in the Caston Tournament Saturday at 11 a.m. against Southwood.

# Delphi shut out by Twin Lakes

The steady rain in Monticello on Friday night didn't help the Oracles' running game as Twin Lakes came out on top 30-0.

The Indians held the Oracles to a minus 37 yards on 24 carries. The equally anemic passing game didn't help with just one completed pass on the evening, good for a net three yards.

The Oracles started the game at their 25 after receiving the kickoff, but within a minute they were facing a 2nd and 32 at their 3-yard line after a pair of penalties and a bad lateral. Dylan McKay of TL caught the Dustin Salyer ball at the 35-yard line and returned it for a touchdown to give their offense a 7-point cushion before they had to put on their helmets.

Blake Underhill intercepted an Oracle pass three plays later to again assist the Indians' offense by giving them the ball at the visitors' 35 to begin their first offensive drive. Garrett Howe ran 21 yards to finish the drive and make the score 14-0 after the extra point by Cameron Harl.

Twin Lakes held the ball for over half the second pe-

riod on a 16-play drive that went from their own 17-yard line to the Oracle 19 before being stopped. A sack by Travis Yoakum on a 4th and seven forced a turnover on downs.

On the ensuing TL possession Yoakum again was at the right spot when he recovered an Indian fumble after Matt Dent knocked the ball loose at the Delphi 18-yard line. The opportunity to climb

back into the game didn't last long as, on the very next play, the Oracles' AJ Beckett fumbled the wet ball and the Indians recovered.

This time it took only two plays for the Indians to

stretch the score to 20-0. Brad Roth and Justin Salyer both broke through to block the extra point.

The second half began with the Indians driving 70 yards in 12 plays. The final 24 by McKay made it 28-0 after a two pass conversion by the Indians. After a TL penalty for unsportsman-like behavior during the kickoff return the Oracles had the ball near midfield. Two plays later a high snap sailed over Beckett's head that resulted in a 17-yard loss for Delphi.

After a TL punt, on the last play of the third period, the Oracles were faced with a 2nd and 11 at their 16-yard line, when another high snap got past the QB. An alert Oracle fell on the ball at the one-yard line.

The first play of the final quarter provided the final points of the game when Tanner Lynde was tackled in the end zone by the TL's Aaron Connell for a safety.

The Indians evened up their record to 2 wins and 2 losses (1-1 in the conference) while the Oracles fall to 0-4 (0-2 conference).

The Oracles next chance to win a game is at 7 p.m. Friday when they entertain the (2-2) Clinton Prairie Gophers for Homecoming at Berto Field.
