House.”

Wayne Remaly, another member of the Clay Township advisory board, said the current fire station has been at that location since the 1930s.

“The current station can’t house all our trucks now,” Frey said. “One’s at the City Building. And traffic’s a problem where the station is now.”

Mike Rothenberger is the Rossville fire chief. He’s been on the department 19 years and he’s been chief for almost 10 years.

“It was on my list of goals when I became fire chief to get a new station built,” he said. “We’ll have about three times the room we have now, and that’s a big plus for us. We’ll be able to get all the trucks in the same building.”

There are 34 active firefighters on the department and eight cadettes.

Frey said his family has had two serious fires, and he owes a lot to the firefighters.

“I wouldn’t be here if it wasn’t for the fire department,” he said.

resurfaced and the locker bays would be made into academic rooms which would include new lockers;

- Exterior doors and windows would be replaced with upgraded hardware throughout the interior;
- New fixtures, partitions and finishes in the restrooms;
- Improvements to general areas which have not already been renovated, new ceiling, lights and upgrade to walls and floors;
- System renovations include; HVAC, temperature controls, electrical, emergency lighting, technology, plumbing, intercom, phone and clocks;
- Security improvements will be made to the video surveillance, door access and vestibules;
- Site changes in areas of lighting upgrades, re-working the circulation into the school and adding an ADA lift to the office area.

The new plan includes renovations to the middle school:

- Changing the old art and music rooms into drama, choral, music classrooms and science labs;
- Sound attenuation in the building along with new ceilings and lights in cafeteria and;
- Alternate renovations could include; reconfiguring the administration area for office area plus two general classrooms.

The \$18 million plan would have included the additional renovations to the high school:

- High school and middle school principal’s office and staff addition;
- Turn the old administration area into six new computer labs;
- A remodeling of the Agricultural labs and classrooms;
- Upgrades to the Physical Education area: Fitness and weight room, locker, wrestling and laundry rooms; add showers to high school football locker area; add ceramic tile wains coating to pool area and changes to concession area;
- Improvements to the exterior of building would have included, tuck point brick and repair and/or replace stucco surfaces.

The \$18 million plan for the middle school would have included:

- New freezer/cooler to the kitchen and an added water supply;
- A remodeling of the area into two classrooms.

The school corporation board of school trustees, superintendent and staff encourage all county taxpayers and residents to attend the public hearing to gain as much information as possible about the proposed renovation project. The public 1028 hearing was designed to allow community members to register concerns and provide suggestions and input into the process of school renovation.

The Farm Service Agency (FSA) is accepting applications for two types of emergency loans.

As a result of damage and losses caused by severe storms, tornadoes, torrential rainfall, flooding and flash flooding that occurred from May 30, 2008, and continuing in Carroll, Cass, Clinton, Pulaski, Tippecanoe and White counties, farmers who suffered damage may apply for FSA assistance to restore their operation to its pre-disaster condition. Deadline for applying is March 16.

As a result of damage and losses caused by hail that occurred from June 21-22 in Carroll, White, Cass, Pulaski and Tippecanoe counties, farmers who suffered loss may apply for FSA assistance to restore their operation to its pre-disaster condition. Deadline for applying is April 14.

understanding between the city and county E-911 for combined dispatch was discussed. It was compiled by E-911 director Jay Dee Cree and is being reviewed by city and county attorneys. Strasser said there should be no further cost to the city for phone lines. However, he said there were issues still to be resolved. The city wants a representative to sit on the E-911 board and a policy needs to be in place to solve conflicts and deal with issues.

Land use plan
Carroll County Comprehensive Land Use Plan Development Steering Committee member Miriam Robeson presented the completed plan. She said the Delphi part of the plan would be formally presented to the city council in November after a public hearing and final vote at the Oct. 28 APC meeting at 7 p.m.

Robeson briefly described areas of the plan that were the desires for Delphi such as airport development, historic preservation and promoting community character.

Robeson said the steering committee would continue to work after the plan is adopted to revamp zoning ordinances.

Delphi Municipal Airport
Airport manager Brian Stirm reported the airport would host helicopter rides to those wanting to view fall leaves or the Pottawattamie Trail of Death Oct. 18 and 19. The trolley will be running between the canal center and the airport.

Council member Brian Garrison requested Stirm provide documentation of how much fuel was bought and sold at the airport, as well as figures about hangar rentals to future council meetings.

Garrison also inquired about four large tanks he found stored at the airport. Stirm explained the tanks were storage tanks for the proposed Swift fuel pilot plant planned to be located at

the airport.

Garrison asked Stirm whether the airport had been storing product for the company before anyone had approved their presence there. Stirm explained that the airport board had approved storing the tanks on airport property for Swift.

Street department
Street commissioner Aaron Lyons assured citizens items put out for recycling are being recycled. He said the truck used is cheaper than more complicated ones to maintain. Items are co-mingled in the truck but are sorted at the recycling facility.

Lyons reported gravel removed from Armory Road was being used at the wastewater plant and on areas such as alleys.

Other business
Strasser announced groundbreaking for the Hoosier Heartland Corridor would be in Lafayette on Oct. 22 at 10:30 a.m. The public is invited to attend. Interested parties are urged to contact the city building for details.

Grants coordinator Jean Howell announced the façade renovation of the Assion-Ruffing City Hall won the Historic Building Rehabilitation Award from Indiana Main Street.

Utilities Manager Dick Vansickle reported the city is now in charge of maintenance for the Water Tower Place sewers. Tower lights were replaced on all city water towers.

The council passed ordinance 2008-8 setting city salaries on first and second readings. The third and final reading will be at the November meeting.

The council will hold a special meeting, Oct. 20 at 7 p.m. The next regular meeting will be Nov. 3 at 7 p.m.

Enrollments for the county schools this year show a loss of about 126 pupils in the grades and of about 92 in the high schools. 2,529 are enrolled in the grades this year as compared to 2,655 last year. 868 are enrolled in the high school as compared to 960 last year. Carrollton and Rockfield high schools both show gains. Bringhurst, Delphi, and Pymont are the only schools showing an increase in attendance in the grades.

Camden becomes the third largest high school in the county with an enrolment of 94 while Burlington has 89. Last year Burlington had 105 and Camden 98. Rockfield high now has more pupils than Cutler which this year has the same as Carrollton, 67. Cutler was the fifth largest high school in the county.

Camden also became the third largest grade school in the county, taking this away from Burlington also.
